Dear Mr. Doyle,

Champions for Life is seeking to expand and/or amend the Special Use Permit issued in 2009 (and amended in 2013) for activities at Everest Park in Town of Owasco.

Upon receipt of your letter dated July 21, 2021 noting that the town had received a petition from certain residents along North Road to address some issues arising from the operation of the Park, Champions for Life, who operates Everest, and the Everest Association for Family Enrichment, who owns the property that Everest uses, met to discuss the petition, the traffic at the Park, and what we could do to ameliorate the concerns that our neighbors presented to the Town.

In response to Mr. Bullard's petition, Champions for Life has:

- 1. Met with Mr. Bullard via phone conference and with him and Jim Clark (another North Road neighbor) in person to discuss their concerns and those of the persons who signed the petition.
- 2. Worked with the Cayuga County Sheriff's Department to increase traffic enforcement efforts on Event Days, and to use a speed control device on the North Road approach to Everest Park.
- 3. Notified all of our participants, coaches, and spectators via email and our website that the area is a rural one, requesting that they take special care to be considerate and cautious as they drove to the park.
- 4. Investigated the use of a bussing service to transport participants, coaches, and spectators to Everest Park from Auburn High School on Event Days. Please see the attached estimate of \$11,625/one day tournament.
- 5. Split our large age range tournaments (from K-12) that would typically take place on a single day, to a two day tournament, in order to lessen the traffic congestion.
- 6. Explored scheduling our tournaments so that age groups are split into sessions spread out over a longer period of time, meaning less cars entering the park at once.
- 7. Informed our participants of alternate routes to the Park, including entering via Swarthout Road from Route 38A, or even from the other end of North Road, from the Hamlet of Owasco.

Traffic counters were installed just inside the entrance to the Park on July 11, 2021, and again on September 18, 2021. Each showed in the thousands of vehicles, well above the estimates in the amended Special Use Permit from 2014. However, in the application for the amended Special Use Permit, we attached the use plan for the park, showing seven athletic fields (one existing, six new, of which we built four), and were informed that the town did not think additional permits or or approvals from the Town of Owasco would be needed. Certainly, in the intervening years, the Park has grown considerably, with our tournaments typically bringing between 25 and 35 teams to the Park, the Finger Lakes Mud Run

(heading into its eleventh year) bringing between 650 and 850 visitors to the park, and other smaller events three or four times per year that may bring a couple hundred visitors to the Park each time. In addition to the events that Champions for Life holds at the Park, we do act as hosts to others, including the North Star Soccer tournament, Upstate Lacrosse Association, and sports practices for many local teams. A detailed 'typical' calendar, with estimated numbers of teams, is attached. For each lacrosse team, we expect an average of 16 people (one coach, 15 participants), and for each person, we estimate two cars, to include the participant and at least one spectator per person. For each soccer team, we expect an average of 13 people (one coach, 12 participants), and for each person, we estimate two cars, to include the participant and at least one spectator per person. We increased our number for each event by 15% to include extra persons (spectators, volunteers, etc.). As you can see, over the course of the year, we may see an increase of perhaps 31,000 vehicles entering the park. Unfortunately, we do not have traffic counts that show the typical traffic on North Road. The additional 31,000 vehicles, taken over a year, is an increase on average of about 85 vehicles per day, or just under 4 cars per hour over the course of one day. While we realize that on our event days, there are of course more than four cars an hour driving by, traffic only feels considerably more intense on a handful of days when we have larger events.

As part of our preparation for this request, we surveyed recent Everest Park program participants regarding the Park and our activities there. We also approached a number of persons from the survey, who stated they were Town of Owasco residents to drill down on their particular experiences at the Park. Many of the Town residents we approached live within one or two miles of the Park, and are both familiar with our Event Day traffic, and the increased traffic for other events that take place within the Town of Owasco, like the Independence Day fireworks at Emerson Park, weddings and other events at the Emerson Park Pavilion, plays and musicals at the Merry Go Round Playhouse, Moto-Cross at Frozen Ocean, the weekly Farmers Market at the Owasco Firehouse, the monthly Pancake Breakfast at the same Firehouse, and the various events at the Ward O'Hara Agricultural Museum, like the Festival of Trees and Remember the Big 6 Picnic in July. Each of these events brings with it increased traffic to their locations. Attached are a sample of the statements in support of our programming at Everest Park. Many others have pledged to speak on our behalf at any public meetings scheduled to discuss this application.

In addition, we contacted local hotels, including the Hilton Garden Inn, the Holiday Inn, and the Inn at the Finger Lakes in Auburn, to ask about their occupancy during our events. We also contacted the Cayuga County Tourism Office to inquire about the average number of dollars visitors to our region might spend when staying for a night or a weekend.

Hilton Garden Inn

The Hilton Garden Inn asks their guests what is bringing them to town and tracks their answers. With that information, they were able to tell us the number of rooms booked because of events we were hosting at Everest (13 rooms on June 5 and 13 rooms on June 6 at \$239 per night, 11 rooms on June 13 at \$259 per night, 8 rooms on July 11 at \$159 per night, 14 rooms on July 24 at \$165 per night, 11 rooms on October 9 at \$174 per night, and 10 rooms on October 24 at \$204 per night), as well as their average occupancy on the nights before and after our events. Over the course of 2021, they attribute an increase in gross revenue of \$16,599, with an average occupancy of 95% on Everest Park adjacent weekends.

Holiday Inn

The Holiday Inn only had numbers for one weekend, but on that weekend, they rented 50 rooms (out of 165) that indicated they were here for an Everest Park event, at \$169 per room, for a total increase in gross revenue \$8450

Inn of the Finger Lakes

The Inn of the Finger Lake rented out at least 16 rooms for a two night stay, during the weekend of June 5-6 at \$149 per night, who indicated they were here for an Everest Park event, with a gross revenue for that weekend alone of \$4768. They did not track the remainder of the summer/fall for Everest Park event stays.

We are able to say, with confidence that the events in 2021 at Everest Park brought in a minimum of \$29,817 just to our local hotels. In addition, the Cayuga County Office of Tourism's 2019 study states that on average, each visitor to our community who spends at least one night here, spends an additional \$148 per person per day. Conservatively, if we assume that for each hotel night (162 nights) that was booked, with at least two people (a parent and a child) in that room, an additional \$148 was spent, then Champions for Life Everest Park events brought in an additional \$47,952 in spending to our local community. If those rooms included additional parents, other adults, other children, that number only goes up.

Events at Everest Park do not just benefit Champions for Life. They benefit our entire community, financially and in other ways as well.

Consider our guests at the Brian Bisgrove Home of Courage. The BBHC is the log cabin that sits on the hill as you enter Everest Park. Named in honor and in memory of Brian Bisgrove, son of Jack and Marsha Bisgrove, the BBHC is a program of Champions for Life that offers families who have children with life threatening illnesses or chronic, debilitating conditions up to five days of rest and relaxation at no cost to the family. Champions for Life provides everything, from linens and towels, to food and drink, as well as day passes to area attractions, like the YMCA, Owasco Paddles, baseball tickets, whatever we can that the families and their children could want or need during their stay. Since 2014, we have served over 300 families at the BBHC, many of them from Cayuga County, or immediately surrounding Cayuga County. BBHC families never pay for their stay or the amenities we provide; and approximately three quarters of the money needed to run this program comes directly from events we hold at Everest Park, including our tournaments and the Finger Lakes Mud Run. For every family who stays with us, Champions for Life spends about \$500, which includes groceries, local amenities, staffing, cleaning, and general maintenance and upkeep to the Home.

Attached are some of the testimonials and photos from past guests at the BBHC, to give an idea of what this program in particular means to the people who have stayed there.

Events at Everest Park are an integral part of our community, support Champions for Life and its charitable programming, and bring tens of thousands of dollars to Cayuga County businesses. We respectfully request that our Special Use Permit be expanded to allow Champions for Life to continue to hold our events at Everest Park. We will notify our neighbors of our programming calendar, and

expected traffic load, ahead of each event, and do everything in our power that is financially feasible to keep our guests from speeding, to obey all traffic laws, and to be good guests when in the area.



617.20 Appendix A State Environmental Quality Review FULL ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT FORM

Purpose: The full EAF is designed to help applicants and agencies determine, in an orderly manner, whether a project or action may be significant. The question of whether an action may be significant is not always easy to answer. Frequently, there are aspects of a project that are subjective or unmeasurable. It is also understood that those who determine significance may have little or no formal knowledge of the environment or may not be technically expert in environmental analysis. In addition, many who have knowledge in one particular area may not be aware of the broader concerns affecting the question of significance.

The full EAF is intended to provide a method whereby applicants and agencies can be assured that the determination process has been orderly, comprehensive in nature, yet flexible enough to allow introduction of information to fit a project or action.

Full EAF Components: The full EAF is comprised of three parts:

- Part 1: Provides objective data and information about a given project and its site. By identifying basic project data, it assists a reviewer in the analysis that takes place in Parts 2 and 3.
- Part 2: Focuses on identifying the range of possible impacts that may occur from a project or action. It provides guidance as to whether an impact is likely to be considered small to moderate or whether it is a potentially large impact. The form also identifies whether an impact can be mitigated or reduced.
- Part 3: If any impact in Part 2 is identified as potentially large, then Part 3 is used to evaluate whether or not the impact is actually important.
